### **A Two-Bagger for January Speakers**

In January Andrew Ralowicz and Ron Kuipers will discuss how things are going with the Chapter's Chestnut orchard, how well the national program to restore the Chestnut trees is coming along and future plans in the overall Chestnut restoration program.

Dr. Andrew Ralowicz earned his Ph.D. from the University of Arizona in Plant Genetics, focusing on Population or Statistical Genetics, with a minor in Soils, Water, and Engineering. He is a past member of the American Society of Photogrammetry and Remote Sensing, a member of the United States Geospatial Intelligence Foundation, and completed thermal mapping and resource management, crop assessments, land cover, and forest fire fuel mapping projects around the world.

Currently, Andrew is a Senior Principal Scientist for a global aerospace company. He has been on the Board of Directors of The American Chestnut Foundation (TACF) Maryland Chapter since 2014 serving on multiple committees within the organization.

A Rockville Ike since 2008, Andrew received the 2016 Gorman Fry Conservation Award from the Chapter for his work with the TACF.



Ron Kuipers joined IWLR in 1997 when Jim Hill recruited him to work on the wood duck program. He later joined The American Chestnut Foundation (TACF) and in 2006 combined his IWL and TACF interests to persuade our chapter to establish a chestnut orchard on our property The success of our small orchard has since then inspired the establishment of chestnut orchards at the Wildlife Achievement, Southern Maryland and BCC chapters. Ron holds BS and MA degrees in Geography and is retired from the CIA.

# **CPR Classes Offered**

The Chapter's annual CPR certification classes for 2020 are scheduled for Saturday, Jan. 25 and Saturday, February 22.

If you or someone you know needs American Heart Association certification (or recertification), this is the opportunity. IWLA-Rockville Chapter member and qualified CPR instructor, Sheila Colihan is again offering the class for \$35 (most classes cost \$85 to \$100) to cover materials but it's limited to eight students.

AHA certification is only valid for two years so if you were certified in one of the classes that we offered in 2018 (or before), then you are due again. The class runs from 2:00 pm to 6:00 pm in the Chapter House, upper level.

Because we view this as a public service to the community, the class welcomes non-members of the Chapter who need certification -- friends, family, work colleagues -- at the member price.

### Wood Duck Work Days Set

Every Sunday in January the Chapter will hold work day activities to tend to the 75 Wood Duck nest boxes that are part one of our most significant conservation projects. So get the jump on your work hours for 2020 by joining one or more workdays.

Most of the boxes are in the McKeeBeshers Wildlife Management Area along River Road, west of Poolesville. We meet at 10:00 a.m. at a location in the field that will be announced by email the week before. Each workday, teams check the boxes, make repairs, log nesting data from the previous spring's nesting and prep each box for the new nesting season, which starts in late March. The work is usually done by 1:00 - 2:00 p.m. each day.

The boxes are in wooded swamps and that requires wading in shallow water so chest waders or hip boots are ideal. For those who don't have their own, the Chapter has a few loaner pair (bring dry socks!). All tools and repair materials are supplied; you just bring the warm, willing body.
