March Speaker Spotlight

Julie Tucker will be our speaker and she will be discussing the Keeping Seniors Safe Program. Julie has 33 years with the Maryland Department of Juvenile Services, working with youth and families who have come in contact with the police or court system, supervising case managers, retired in 2013, including 10 years as part of a collaborative effort at Maryland Police and Correctional Training Commission, under the auspices of the Governor's Office of Crime Control and Prevention in the State.



Ms. Tucker was a certified instructor providing inservice training to Maryland Department of Juvenile Services, Maryland Department of Public Safety and Correction Services, and law enforcement agencies throughout the State.

She has been with Montgomery County Department of Police Keeping Seniors Safe program since May, 2017. Ms. Tucker is also currently participating in the Truancy Prevention Program through the Montgomery County State's Attorney's Office.

2020 Firearms Training Courses

Below are the NRA firearms training and Chapter developed courses offered in 2020. All course activity will be conducted at the Chapter. Member and group discounts are available.

All NRA Basic Courses are beginning, full-day, handson courses. Course materials are provided and certificates are awarded upon successful completion. Past students have ranged from beginner to experienced shooters. Students are encouraged to bring their own firearm or they can use Instructor firearms. Some students have never handled a firearm before and end up being a pretty good shot by the end of the course. Everyone looks forward to going to the range and we make sure it is a safe, educational and enjoyable experience that boosts confidence. All course lessons are delivered by a team of volunteer NRA Certified Instructors. Individual coaching is provided during the classroom and live-fire exercises by experienced Instructors and even some competition shooters. Breakfast, morning snack, lunch, afternoon snack, and beverages are provided.

NRA Basic Metallic Cartridge Reloading Course (2 offerings). This course is presented in two sessions: 7 PM - 10 PM (Tuesday) and 8 AM - 5:30 PM (Saturday) on May 12 and 16, Lower Chapter House and Pistol Range. Students reload pistol (9mm) and rifle (5.56 NATO) ammunition, and then shoot their reloaded 9mm ammunition on the range. Components for reloading ammunition are provided.

NRA Basic Rifle Shooting Course (2 offerings). 8 AM – 5:30 PM on March 21 and December 12, Lower Chapter House and Pistol Range. In this course, students fire 10 rounds using a .22LR rimfire rifle in each of the prone, standing (supported and non-supported), and benchrest shooting positions. Ammunition is provided.

NRA Basic Pistol Shooting Course (2 offerings). 8 AM – 5:30 PM on April 18 and August 22, Lower Chapter House and Pistol Range. In addition to the NRA content, this course includes a supplemental section on MD Law to satisfy the Handgun Qualification License (HQL) requirement for purchasing, transferring, or renting a regulated firearm in MD. Instructions on how to apply for an HQL are also provided. Students fire 25 rounds using a .38Spl revolver and 25 rounds using a 9mm semi-automatic pistol. Ammunition is provided. The HQL only requires firing 1 round so you get 50 times the requirement and shooting experience.

NRA Basic Personal Protection In The Home Course (1 offering). 8 AM – 5:30 PM on October 17, Lower Chapter House and Pistol Range. As a prerequisite to this class, students must have successfully completed the NRA Basic Pistol Shooting Course (proof of completion required). Students should bring a firearm and 100 rounds (minimum) of ammunition to shoot on the range. An extensive session on MD Law is provided by an attorney.

2020 Firearms Training Courses (continued)

Advanced Metallic Cartridge Reloading Course (2 offerings). This Chapter developed course is presented in two sessions: 7 PM - 10 PM (Tuesday) and 8 AM -5:30 PM (Saturday) on July 14 and 18, and November 10 and 14, Lower Chapter House and Rifle Range. As a prerequisite to this course, students must have successfully completed the NRA Basic Metallic Cartridge Reloading Course (proof of completion required). This advanced course focuses on precision reloading for long range rifle shooting and the techniques necessary to produce precision ammunition that consistently holds groups less than 0.5 inch at 100 yards (less than 0.25 inch is the preferred goal for 100 yards). Students test their reloads at the range and shoot through a chronograph to measure achieved velocity and compare against the expected velocity. Students should bring a .308 Winchester or 7.62 NATO rifle to shoot on the range.

Shotgun Slug Accuracy Clinic (1 offering). 12:30 PM – 5:00 PM on September 19. Lower Chapter House and Pistol Range. This Chapter developed clinic brings the techniques of rifle shooting to the rifled barrel shotgun. Safety, application of the fundamentals of rifle shooting, and testing ammunition for accuracy will be covered. Students should bring a rifled barrel shotgun preferably with a scope.

Learn Archery This Summer!

If you or your kids ever wanted to learn the fundamentals of archery or improve your skills, IWLAR's Summer Archery is the program for you! You'll learn proper shooting form and fundamentals in a safe and family-friendly environment from our USAAtrained instructors.

Children 8-10 years old are taught in a small group with fun, learning activities--like shooting watermelons and 3D alligators. Older children and adults are coached at the main archery range, and then later you'll be able to shoot from the tower.

As an IWLAR member in good standing, registration opens March 1. Members can register their children ages 8-18 and member adults. Non-IWLAR member registration opens April 1 and is only available for children 8-18. The program runs on Sundays from June 7-August 9. All equipment is provided.

Volunteer Lead Needed for Pistol Range Lighting

The Chapter Range Safety Committee examined lighting the pistol range to provide additional shooting times for chapter sponsored events (e.g., Outdoor Pistol League, etc.) as daylight hours shorten during the Fall season. For example, persons have expressed interest in joining the Outdoor Pistol League but can't do so as early end of the matches (due to waning daylight) prevents them from participating because of difficulty getting to the range from work in time.

Currently, the shotgun range has four large short arc mercury lights that were used when trap matches were held. Since trap shooting was discontinued, those lights would be available for use on the pistol range. The Range Safety Committee conducted comprehensive tests of their ability to properly light the range and their impact on the surrounding area. The conclusions reached were that the performance of the mercury lights is sufficient to proceed with producing a plan for moving the lights to the pistol range.

To accomplish this, a volunteer is needed to produce and lead a detailed execution plan for moving and installing the lights. The plan would be presented to the Range Safety Committee, the Board of Directors, and the General Membership for approval as a special project.
