The Rockville Email Group

The Rockville Chapter operates a members-only email list for announcements and discussions among members. The newsletter comes out once a month, so the email group is the only way to stay informed about important things that occur in between newsletters. You will be added to iwlar@googlegroups.com automatically when you become a member unless you request not to be added. You can remove your address from the list anytime but we are hopeful that you will not do this because the list is the most effective way to receive short notice activity announcements and cancellations.

Suggestions for Email Etiquette

There have been periodic discussions about the volume and content of exchanges on the Chapter Email group. The primary purpose of the Google Group is to keep members informed for the latest developments. Chapter members have also used it to inform other members of new conservation or sporting information. On occasion, members have responded to update information previously disseminated.

Things have become more problematic when the discussions turn into expressions of opinion or criticisms of previously posted material. On occasion it has resulted in complaints about the level of acrimony and/or unwanted messages.

A good rule of thumb is to avoid responding to a particular message by emailing the entire group unless a vital bit of information needs to be updated. For example, if a Chapter wide email gives an incorrect date or location for an event, a chapter wide correction is appropriate. However, if, for example, a member wants to express an opinion on a previously disseminated message, it would be best if they respond only to the sender and any others the respondent knows would be interested.

IWLA-Rockville COVID-19 Range Operations

The rifle and pistol ranges became available for limited use by Range Officer qualified members May 20. The archery range became available for limited use by members with Archery Approved, Range Approved, and Range Officer privileges May 20. The rifle and pistol ranges opened for limited use and staffed by Duty Range Officers from 1 - 5 PM Saturdays and Sundays beginning May 23.

COVID-19 is a recognized health hazard which has the ability to cause death and serious illness. The Rockville Chapter Officers and Board of Directors, based on the directives of Maryland and Montgomery County, authorized re-opening of Chapter ranges with limited operations. To address Maryland and Montgomery County requirements, supplemental range rules were approved that represent reasonable steps to mitigate the COVID-19 hazard. The supplemental range rules remain in effect until rescinded by the Chapter Officers and Board of Directors.

The Chapter Officers and Board of Directors authorized the Chapter Range Safety Committee to alter the supplemental range rules if necessary, based on operational experience, while remaining compliant with Maryland and Montgomery County requirements. Any supplemental range rule changes will be promptly communicated to the membership and posted on the chapter website. Members are responsible for understanding and abiding by the supplemental range rules at all times.

During open rifle and pistol range hours (1 - 5 PM Saturdays and Sundays) while the ranges are staffed by Duty Range Officers, members are required to reserve a time slot on-line to regulate range traffic and minimize congregating and waiting. Separate sign-up links are available for the rifle and pistol ranges. Members must have an on-line reservation to visit the ranges during open range hours. Duty Range Officers will instruct persons without reservations to depart the range areas.

The Supplemental Range Rules and sign-up links are available on the Chapter website (www.iwlar.org) for the rifle and pistol ranges.

Reusable bags have become increasingly popular in recent years as consumers try to cut down on the plastic bags that show up in our streams, rivers and oceans. However, the novel coronavirus has given this trend pause. Research shows the coronavirus may remain viable for hours or days on a variety of surfaces, however fabrics have not been tested. To be cautious, the County Department of Environmental Protection recommends cleaning and/or disinfecting your reusable bags according to CDC guidelines. WE HAVE A BABY!

Chapter member Dana Williams sent me an email on April 22 reporting seeing a large bird flapping its wings on the ground blind in the upper field. Miles Greenbaum checked it out the next day, saw a black vulture leaving the blind and took a photo of two eggs inside the blind. The vulture returned to the blind when Miles walked away. On May 10, Barry Nel took a photo of the chick (no clue as to what happened to the second egg).

Black vultures are not uncommon in this area but are more common around the Eastern Shore. They are protected by Federal and Maryland state law. They are beneficial scavengers and we've all seen them feasting on the roadside, cleaning up the mess car impacts with other animals can often leave. They prefer fresh carcasses but will eat decaying meat as well.

Prime real estate for nesting include tree hollows, abandoned buildings and, obviously, ground blinds! The monogamous pair will often reuse successful nesting sites for many years. Both the male and the female sit on the eggs to incubate them and when the chicks hatch, both participate in feeding them.

It's interesting that in this area in the summer, the black vultures practice urohydrosis. They pee on their legs to cool off! Another interesting action that is common to them is that when threatened, vultures vomit to lighten their body weight so they can escape more easily into flight. Vomiting also serves as a defense mechanism to deter predators that may be threatening the birds.

This is pretty cool...a group of black vultures is alled a committee, a group in flight is called a kettle and a group feeding together at a carcass is called a wake!

Some people believe that the vulture is a positive animal totem, representing birth and death as well as new beginnings and positive energy.
