November Speaker Spotlight

After graduating from Valparaiso University, Warren Simonsen served in the United States Army from 1971 to 1973. Warren received his basic training at Fort Leonard Wood, MO. He was selected to become a member of the 3rd U.S. Infantry Division (the "Old Guard") and was stationed at Ft. Myer, VA, next to Arlington Cemetery. Shortly after arriving at Ft. Myer, Warren witnessed the changing of the guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. He knew immediately that he wanted to serve his country by becoming a Tomb Guard. Shortly thereafter he volunteered and was accepted for training as a sentinel. The training consisted of four months of practice and testing of in-depth knowledge of Arlington Cemetery and the history of the Tomb.



For his service as a Tomb Guard, Warren earned the Tomb Guard Identification Badge, which is the second least awarded badge in the Army. Fewer than 675 have been awarded since 1958. Warren continues to visit the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier and interacts with other former Tomb Guards who are members of the Society of The Honor Guard, Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. This is an organization committed to protecting and enhancing the welfare and image of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier and the sentinels who stand guard, past and present.

Ranges Short Shots

The Montgomery County Firearms Safety Committee must inspect firearms ranges every three years. Upon successful completion of a comprehensive safety inspection, the Committee issues a certificate to operate. The Chapter's firearms ranges passed the Committee ranges inspection October 9 and will be issued new certificates to operate until October 2020.

Coincident with the ranges inspection are forthcoming changes to the Chapter's Range Rules. With Board of Directors approval and Montgomery County Firearms Safety Committee authorization, shotguns may be patterned on the pistol range in accordance with the following procedures:

- All firing is under direct supervision of designated range officers during pre-arranged, specified times
- All firing will be conducted with shoulder stocked, long guns only; minimum barrel length is 18.5 in.
- All firing is performed from position 2 into the designated area to the left of 50 yard position 1
- Target backing shall consist of 3' x 4' white plastic cardboard
- No firing on other positions is allowed while patterning
- Lead or Bismuth shot only (steel shot is prohibited)
- Shooters shall police their shot wads
- Any gauge, shot size, choke, or shell length is permissible

Note that pre-arranged, specified times will only occur while the ranges are closed and not staffed by a Duty Range Officer.

The above procedures, along with a few other changes (such as elimination of the blue flag at the Archery Range) will be published in revised Range Rules that will be available November 30. The new rules will be posted on the Chapter website with hardcopy at the Chapter House.

Rifle Range 50 Yard Target Use

The rifle range 50 yard target is for zeroing only. Once an initial zeroing "on paper" group is achieved, shooters should relocate their target to the 100 or 140 yard distances for precise adjustments and practice. During the last two months, the 50 yard target frame experienced damage multiple times requiring repairs from inattentive and excessive shooting. Applying shooting fundamentals, fire a few careful shots (not a magazine) to obtain an "on paper" grouping with the 50 yard target, then relocate your target to the other distances.

Air Pistol is a Great Opportunity to Practice Shooting

Although the name "Air Pistol" might conjure up the image of a kids' game, the Chapter's Air Pistol League is very much an adult affair and one that allows users of firearms a great opportunity to work on their shooting skills.

The Air Pistol League runs in the fall, winter and early spring and costs \$20 for Chapter members for the entire season. Shooters can bring their own air pistols or use those provided by the Chapter, which are Russian-made Baikal IZH-46s. Shooting takes place in the upper level of Chapter House each Tuesday from 4:00 to 6:30 pm. There are seven lanes with targets 10 meters away. It's a "for fun" competition, where each shooter will take 10 shots at each three targets with two circle silhouettes, for 30 in total. Shooters must provide their own pellets and the pellets need to be "wadcutter" (flat tipped), however, even those can do damage to whatever they hit, so the Chapter has a curtain between the targets and the wall.



According to Tom Perazella, the Air Pistol League participants are a broad mix. Generally, those who are retired shoot in the early hours of each session and those coming from work tend to shoot later. Although using an air pistol isn't identical to using a conventional firearm, there is overlap in aiming, breathing and shooting. It's also a chance to shoot during the week for those who can only use the pistol and rifle ranges on the weekends.

Items to Donate: 1) Current magazines NOT more than six (6) months old including but not limited to hunting, fishing, and shooting sports: *Life*, *People*, *Atlantic*, *Gourmet*, *Forbes*, sports of all types, etc. 2) CDs: any and all types of music, including "books on tape." 3) DVDs: action, documentary, comedy, sports, musicals, drama, etc. 4) Portable/personal CD/DVD players in good working order with all accessories like chargers, rechargeable battery packs that take and hold a charge. 5) Books (hardback/paperback)

Requirements for donation and delivery: 1) All magazines <u>must</u> be clean and current, not over six (6) months old or reading material that is dusty or musty, i.e. reading material stored in closets/basements. 2) All items <u>must</u> be tied securely with heavy twine/cord in bundles NO MORE than 20 lb. each – no boxes or paper bags 3) All items <u>must not</u> be dropped off prior to the designated time and location
